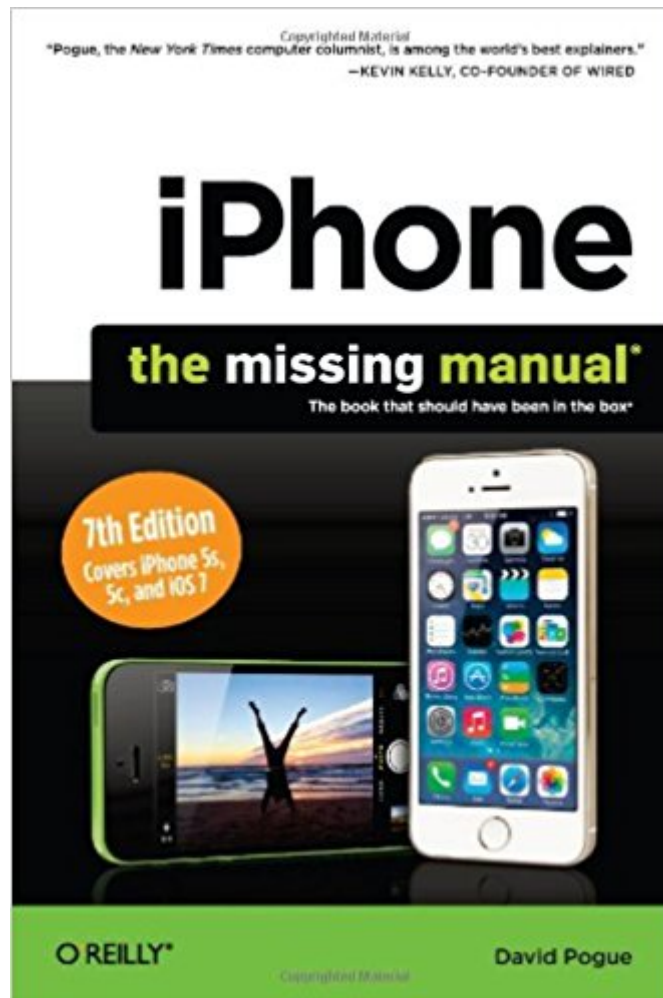

The author makes the statement that calling the iPhone "a phone is practically an insult" and I couldn't agree more. So, given the chance to read this book and find out even more ways my iPhone can make life easier, I jumped at it. I was worried that the book's nearly 600 pages might be a bit daunting. However, I started on page 1 to sort of see how it would go, and before I knew it, I found myself on page 80. I had my iPhone at my side and would read a feature and check it out. What fun! For example, I found a level on the phone. Now, if I see a picture that looks a little crooked I can whip out my iPhone and fix it. When you buy an iPhone, Apple doesn't give you a hefty manual. When I bought the gadget, I had to hunt and peck my way to learn how to use it. This book showed me EVERYTHING about the phone step by step in a cookbook fashion. The book is very current to iOS 7. So, all the new features of the latest operating system are at your fingertips. The book is laid out very nicely, making it and easy to follow. The first 30 pages or so just tell you what you are physically holding in your hand. Okay, maybe in too much detail sometimes like how they make the "gorilla glass" at Corning Glass Works (entertaining for trivia types). The index is generous with lots of references. The book is extremely easy to read - I didn't feel some techie was talking down to me at all. The book covered everything about the phone and then some. I have had my iPhone for over a year I found lots of features in the book I never even imagined were on the phone. I feel I am living in a sci-fi fantasy world sometimes when I use it. One of these days maybe Apple will figure out how to beam me up with an iPhone. The best feature the phone has for me, and the book made it super easy to set up, was "face time." You can call that special someone that who also has an iPhone and actually look at his or her face (or whatever the phone is pointing at) while having a conversation. Now, if Apple can just figure out how to let us smell the apple pie in the oven at a friend's house while talking to the friend, we will really be spoiled. Oh, and This Missing Manual had lots of practical advice, too. For example, how you might stretch your battery life a bit when you can't get to a recharger right away (shut off Blue Tooth and Wi-Fi). It also explained very well what to do if you lose your iPhone (you can erase the whole thing remotely and render it useless to the thief). In conclusion I got a lot out of this book. If you have an iPhone, get the book and you will be glad you did.

I have just had this book in possession for half an hour and am going to cancel a class I signed up for to learn about this iPhone 5S. This is my first phone with Internet and all the goodies, I was totally lost, although my husband has had the 5 for sometime he couldn't even answer some of my questions. I enjoyed reading the earlier editions of this comprehensive book, learning a lot from David Pogue's lucid expository style laced with humor. The publisher, O'Reilly Media, rightly claims: "The Missing Manuals are witty, well written guides to computer products that don't come with printed manuals (which is just about all of them). Each book features a handcrafted index; cross-references to specific page numbers, not just "see Chapter 14"; and an ironclad promise never to put an apostrophe in the possessive pronouns.

It's the Missing Manual. As a professional editor and writer, I admire this promise because I find far too many recent books blemished with this particular error. iPhone 6: The Missing Manual, 9th edition, is an apt subtitle of this comprehensive book as it covers all models with iOS 9 software, including the latest 6s and 6s Plus. Here are a few brief examples of David Pogue's engaging writing style (page numbers below refer to the 9th edition; the location numbers refer to the Kindle version).

"The touchscreen is your mouse, keyboard, dialing pad, and notepad. You might expect it to get fingerprint and streaky. But the modern iPhone has an oleophobic screen. That may sound like an irrational fear of yodeling, but it's actually a coating that repels grease. A single light out wipe on your clothes restores the screen to its right-out-of-the-box crystal sheen." (page 23; location 411).

"The iPhone's onscreen buttons are nice and big, giving your fleshy fingertips a fat target. You can't use a fingernail or a pen tip; one skin contact works. You can also buy an iPhone stylus. But a fingertip is cheaper and harder to misplace." (page 33; location 604).

"Making the Keyboard Work: Some people have no problem tapping those virtual keys; others struggle for days. Either way, here are some tips. Don't be freaked out by the tiny narrow keys. Apple knows your fingertip is fatter than that. So as you type, use the whole pad of your finger to match the skinny keys. You'll be surprised at how fast and accurate this method is. (Tap

don't mash.) This may sound like New Age hooey, but trust the keyboard. Don't pause to check the result after each letter. Just plow on (page 65; location 1173). "The fourth button, Custom, lets you type or dictate a new message on the spot. If you're in a meeting and frankly, your call isn't worth getting fired for, comes to mind" (page 115 ; location 2124). "Voice Command: Believe it or not. Siri is a spinoff from a Department of Defense research project called CALO (Cognitive Assistant that Learns and Organizes) In a very real way, therefore Siri represents your tax dollars at work. The spinoff was run by the Stanford Research Institute, SRI. But that not where Siri's name came from. Siri it turns out, is a Norwegian word meaning beautiful woman who leads you to victory" (page 130; location 2382). The book's five parts comprise 18 Chapters as follows. She's had a landline for some 60 years, but she's never had "voicemail" on her home phone - seriously - because it's too complicated for her, a retired nurse of 30+ years. But, now she even is using Siri to initiate calls and directions to locations now - so, thanks, Mr. Pogue!

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
