Turtle Alveston is a survivor. At fourteen, she roams the woods along the northern California coast. The creeks, tide pools, and rocky islands are her haunts and her hiding grounds, and she is known to wander for miles. But while her physical world is expansive, her personal one is small and treacherous: Turtle has grown up isolated since the death of her mother, in the thrall of her tortured and charismatic father, Martin. Her social existence is confined to the middle school (where she fends off the interest of anyone, student or teacher, who might penetrate her shell) and to her life with her father. Then Turtle meets Jacob, a high-school boy who tells jokes, lives in a big clean house, and looks at Turtle as if she is the sunrise. And for the first time, the larger world begins to come into focus: her life with Martin is neither safe nor sustainable. Motivated by her first experience with real friendship and a teenage crush, Turtle starts to imagine escape, using the very survival skills her father devoted himself to teaching her. What follows is a harrowing story of bravery and redemption. With Turtle's escalating acts of physical and emotional courage, the reader watches, heart in throat, as this teenage girl struggles to become her own hero—and in the process, becomes ours as well. Shot through with striking language in a fierce natural setting, *My Absolute Darling* is an urgently told, profoundly moving read that marks the debut of an extraordinary new writer.

My Absolute Darling: A Novel

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An Best Book of September 2017: There's so much to admire in My Absolute Darling: acute emotional insight, precise and evocative writing about the natural world, and pacing worthy of an action movie. How can this possibly be a debut? But some people live up to their names, and Gabriel Tallent, whose first novel this is, writes with bravura more experienced authors can only envy. His story, which feels a little like a girl-power fairy tale come true, starts dark. Fourteen-year old Julia, called Turtle, or sometimes Kibble, lives with her paranoid, survivalist father in the wilds of Mendocino County. Their ruin of a house has boarded-up windows and "spindled wooden railings overgrown with climbing roses and poison oak." If Turtle is that rose, then her father is the poison oak: his touch (and he touches Turtle) leads to trouble. But he's taught his daughter to shoot and forage -- she can "decipher" the woods, even at night -- and those skills serve her well when she finally starts to free herself from his control. One of the delights of this novel is the way Tallent reveals another culture -- another world, really -- coexisting in Mendocino, where middle-aged women practice yoga naked and swear by "the goddess" while their sons joke about hippies reading Finnegans Wake to their peyote plants. These flashes of humor and evidence of the sometimes goofy pleasures of civilization are like beacons lighting the way to a better life for Turtle, if only she can make her way out of the woods. --Sarah Harrison Smith, Book Review

I thought *My Absolute Darling* was outstandingly good. It is beautifully written, remarkably insightful and completely gripping. This is the story of 12-year-old Julia "Turtle" Alveson who lives with her survivalist father on the fringes of society in Mendocino, California. She is skilled in guns, survival skills and so on, but at sea with other people and in social situations. Told entirely from Turtle's point of view, we see her struggles with understanding her father's obsessive and abusive behaviour which she (and probably he) believes to be what love is. As events and growing maturity begin to make her more aware, the tension between what she has believed and what she begins to recognise as reality grows and Turtle has to wrestle with where her future lies and how, if at all, she can realise it. This doesn't sound like a great read on the face of it, but it is. I genuinely found it hard to put this book down; the story is gripping, with some passages of incredible tension and real adventure, and Gabriel Tallent takes us right inside that young woman's head with her confusion, self-doubt (often spilling into self-loathing) and resilience in a way which I have seldom experienced. The portraits of her and of her monstrous father are fantastically real, and I found the entire thing completely convincing. Be warned that there are some quite horrifying scenes of child abuse, but they are absolutely justified in the context and excellently judged - a world away from the often offensively facile use of child abuse as a theme in run-of-the-mill thrillers. The prose is excellent. Gabriel Tallent writes in a measured, unmelodramatic but rather lyrical style, which brings the people, especially Turtle, wonderfully to life. Just as a tiny example, we get sentences like this: "She waits there in the grass, feeling her every thought stored up and inarticulate within her," and this sort of brilliant distillation of internal experience shines through the book. The sense of place is excellent and dialogue is completely convincing; I especially liked some wonderful episodes of the jokey, wordy, literate chatter of two High School boys as it contrasted with Turtle's near-silent inarticulacy. I find it hard to express quite how good I thought this book was. It is a rare combination of an utterly gripping story, excellent writing and genuine depth of content. Very, very warmly recommended.

This novel about child physical and sexual abuse is as raw, gritty and hardcore as anything I've ever read. It had me stunned by its power and depth, by its ugliness and truth. The author has a rare understanding of victims, especially how their desire to be loved by the abuser has them returning for more abuse because that is what they know. The abuse is predictable and real as nothing else is. The victim understands the rules - shame, secrecy and silence. Their own self-loathing and love/hatred for the abuser becomes a way of life, a way to turn things inward, a way to make understood that which is not understandable. Fourteen year-old Turtle lives with Martin, her father, in

Mendocino, California. She is adept at shooting targets with any type of fire arm and is prepared for attack by any outside forces. She lives with a survivalist mentality that Martin has structured all around her. Their home is almost bare and Turtle hears the rats chomp on their left-overs at night, at least on those nights when Martin doesn't carry her to his bed. The narrative about sexual abuse is as true and as horrific as any I've read in fiction. "His touch brings her skin to life, and she holds it all within the private theater of her mind." "He believes her body to be something that he understands, and, treacherously, it is." What is often the worst experience for victims is their own body's betrayal as it responds viscerally to the abuser. Turtle hates what her body appears to enjoy. Turtle's life is isolated except for school where she appears to be behind academically. She has no friends and she refuses to see the school counselor. When Martin is called to the principal's office because Turtle's teacher has concerns, he is able to side-step any of their suggestions. It appears that the disastrous conditions of Turtle's existence will continue. However, Martin doesn't plan on Turtle meeting Jacob, forming a close and intimate bond with him, and being exposed to his family and the outside world, a world where people thrive. Turtle has the survival skills of a modern-day Rambo but her belief in herself has been formed by self-hatred. She knows her way around guns and the wilderness and there are times when she thinks about escaping the life she's in. She is torn between having promised Martin that she won't run away and her own desire for a different life. As the physical and sexual abuse mount, Turtle's life is crumbling away. This novel is dark, very dark, and if your stomach is weak, I don't recommend it. However, if you want to discover a wonderful new writer and read a book that doesn't veer from truth, even in its most difficult form, read 'My Absolute Darling' by Gabriel Tallent.

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
