

Morris is author of the story from which the film Operation Dumbo Drop was made, and has produced numerous documentary television episodes about the Vietnam War. Wow! At first I was somewhat disappointed due to the lack of actual battle accounts. However; somewhere along the line I became so wrapped up in Jim Moore's descriptive story that I forgot all about the field battles and fire fights I find so fascinating. Moore has a great style that is relaxed yet poignant. I was drawn into his friendships with cowboy, his description of the "Yards" and his special love for the people and the country. An expense amount of information without ever becoming boring or overly verbose. A really exceptional account of the real life affairs of a true soldier who somehow

managed to live (and fight) for years in country w/o becoming hateful or cynical. Absolutely amazing life and a story that describes a side of the Vietnam war rarely written about. In addition, the story was told a way I have never seen portrayed more honestly. I highly recommend this book.

I cannot begin to express how much I enjoyed Jim Morris' personal reflection on his time spent in Vietnam as a Green Beret in the early years of the war, as his account truly hits the mark. A vast conflict, affecting hundreds of thousands of lives, where the worst enemy was often misconception and the anally retentive "red tape syndrome" so indicative of any large military machine. Not afraid to say it like it is - we get to meet such legends as "Cowboy", "Lurette", and discover the true relationship that existed between the VC, Vietnamese, and indigenous tribes such as the Montagnara... We get to dip into the funny side of life in Vietnam - Jim's account of the time he visited a leper colony in the company of a local missionary and ended up sharing a jug of numpai with the village elder through a shared straw (Yuum) had me crying with laughter. And sadly, we see the poignant heartrending reality too - John Link's story near the end of the book was especially tragic and typifies the cruelty of war. A normal guy doing what he can to save a fellow soldier and paying the ultimate price. (Jim himself was badly injured during that same rescue attempt). And this from a man who's worst fear was getting promoted out and being "8 to 5'd to death in a foul little job in a foul little office", and who never felt more alive or at home than when he was out on patrol in an endless sea of green, doing something he felt was more important than life. If you ever feel the need to read a true life tale that's thoroughly engaging and exposes what the conflict was all about, then War Story is just the thing you need. From one veteran who has lived through the crucible of fire to another... Respect, brother. Respect.

Why did I wait so long to read this book. Some of the information gleaned from this book was old news. Senior leaders that were more interested in furthering their own worn out careers than fighting a war, shocking. The fact that the Vietnamese & the montanyards didn't get along, another barn burner. However the fact that the yards wanted their own country is something I had never heard of. Perhaps this was the beginning of the management style of military. Don't do anything stupid & you'll get promoted. The people who are eager & ready to go should be turned loose & the rest should be counting blankets at Ft. Greeley staying out of the real soldiers way. War is not a game that you get awards for a tie. You win or lose period. If you don't like the rules then lets stay home & stop wasting our best & brightest.

I did enjoy it in small portions, the worst thing was having to endure the thoughtless and reckless advice and directions of the superior officers, the ones who had never experienced any combat at all, it annoyed me that this went on and still goes on!! Personally I don't think I could respect or admire any of the USA forces, just because they have a dysfunctional leadership.

I have read better and have read worse. The story line was a bit disjointed and at times a bit confusing. I am not sure I would recommend it. There are better choices out there.
